From Council President Clarke:

2. Can you provide detailed information on the dual enrollment program, including the number of participants and the cost?

The College served 654 dual enrollment students in the 2014-15 academic year, 100 of whom were in the Gateway to College program. Gateway to College is an alternative education program for School District of Philadelphia students from ages 16 to 21 who have dropped out of school but desire to get back on track and earn a diploma and more.

Dual enrollment programs serve capable and exceptional students. The intent is to increase the number of students who go on to postsecondary education and to decrease the need for remedial coursework at postsecondary institutions.

Additionally, Community College of Philadelphia served 225 Advance College Experience (ACE) dual enrollment students during the year. ACE provides college-level courses for highly motivated students entering 9th, 10th, 11th or 12th grades, as well as students pursuing a GED. We accept public, private, charter, archdiocesan and home-schooled students. The ACE fee is \$250 per course. The course fee is paid for in a variety of ways: by parents, by schools and by a third-party.

The total dual enrollment figure for this year is 879. The number of dual enrollment students has been on the rise in recent years.

The total cost of the dual enrollment programs offered by the College is \$746,200. This amount is offset by the discounted tuition of \$255,900. Thus, the cost borne by the College is \$490,300.
